Hassid (2021) eliminating 30 years of precedent has significantly impeded the ability of unions to access agricultural worksites. I deeply understand the need to address the impact of this decision. Any modernization of the Agricultural Labor Relations Act (ALRA) must take these challenges to access into account. AB 616 creates a new process for agricultural employees to elect a labor representative through a ballot card election. This bill contains various inconsistencies and procedural issues related to the collection and review of ballot cards. Significant changes to California's well-defined agricultural labor laws must be carefully crafted to ensure that both agricultural workers' intent to be represented and the right to collectively bargain is protected, and the state can faithfully enforce those fundamental rights.
